I, Craig Kenkel, declare as follows:

- 1. I am the Superintendent of Point Reyes National Seashore (Point Reyes or Park), located in Marin County, California. I was appointed as Superintendent on January 17, 2021. Prior to assuming the superintendency at Point Reyes, I was superintendent of Cuyahoga Valley National Park in Ohio from 2014 through 2020 and superintendent of San Francisco Maritime National Historical Park from 2010 into 2014. I have been an employee of the National Park Service (NPS) for more than 38 years.
- 2. Since arriving at Point Reyes, I have been working diligently with Park staff and members of the NPS planning team to complete the General Management Plan Amendment (GMPA or plan). The Settlement Agreement in the *Resource Renewal Institute* litigation calls for completion of the GMPA planning process by July 14, 2021.
- 3. Our timeline for completing the GMPA was delayed by complications associated with scheduling a hearing on the plan with the California Coastal Commission, which had transitioned to virtual hearings as a result of the pandemic. Working with Commission staff, we were finally able to schedule the hearing for a special date that was added to the Commission's calendar. The hearing was held on April 22, 2021. Completion of our consultation requirements with the Commission under the federal Coastal Zone Management Act was required before we could finalize the GMPA.
- 4. Another delay that we have recently encountered relates to the transition to the new administration. Plans with the scope and complexity of the General Management Plan Amendment raise issues of high public importance and must be reviewed and approved by officials in the Department of the Interior prior to being finalized. Lower level briefings for officials in the National Park Service regional office and Washington, D.C. office are also required.
- 5. After the Coastal Commission hearing process concluded, we began preparing briefing materials on the GMPA for officials in the National Park Service and Department of the Interior. We also worked to schedule times to brief these officials.
- 6. With regard to briefing officials in the Department of the Interior, a key official is the Assistant Secretary, Fish, Wildlife and Parks. The new administration's appointee to this

- position, Shannon Esternoz, was only recently confirmed by the Senate to the Assistant Secretary position on June 24, 2021.
- 7. To date, we have had two preliminary briefings for Ms. Esternoz on the GMPA. Ms. Esternoz and her staff have additional questions about matters covered by the GMPA and have asked for additional briefings. In order to address their questions, the NPS needs time to review matters addressed in the GMPA and prepare additional briefing materials.
- 8. Once the new administration provides its approval, the NPS must then draft a Record of Decision and a Non-Impairment Determination. These are complex documents that require multiple levels of review before being approved.
- 9. Based on my long career with NPS and involvement in controversial planning projects, I estimate that we will need an additional 60 days to conduct these briefings, draft the Record of Decision and Non-Impairment Determination and then complete the GMPA.

Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1746, I declare under penalty of perjury that the foregoing is true and correct to the best of my knowledge, information, and belief.
